Father will be Blessing Candles at Mass on Saturday (January 31st) and Sunday (February 1st) for the celebration of Candlemas (Blessing of Candles) which is actually on Monday, February 2nd. Please bring in your candles or you can purchase candles in the back of the church for \$5 each.

The Catholic Blessing of Candles Day is Candlemas, celebrated annually on February 2nd, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, marking 40 days after Christmas. On this day, churches bless candles for use throughout the year, symbolizing Jesus as the "Light of the World" and aiding in prayer and devotion. This tradition connects the liturgical year, ending the Christmas season of light, with ongoing faith and protection through blessed sacramentals.



With the first prayer intention of the year, Pope Leo XIV invites us to rediscover the transforming power of God's Word, the Word in which "we find the light that guides our steps." Along with the Holy Father, we turn to prayer, asking that we might be a Church that "prays with the Word, that is built upon it and shares it with joy, so that in every person, the hope of a new world may be born again.

The Feast of Saints Timothy and Titus, companions of St. Paul, celebrated on **January 26th**, marking their role as early bishops and spiritual successors, with Timothy leading the church in Ephesus and Titus in Crete, as detailed in Paul's Pastoral Epistles (1 & 2 Timothy, Titus). This memorial honors their dedication to spreading the Gospel, guiding new Christians, and serving as models of pastoral leadership, often observed the day after St. Paul's Conversion.

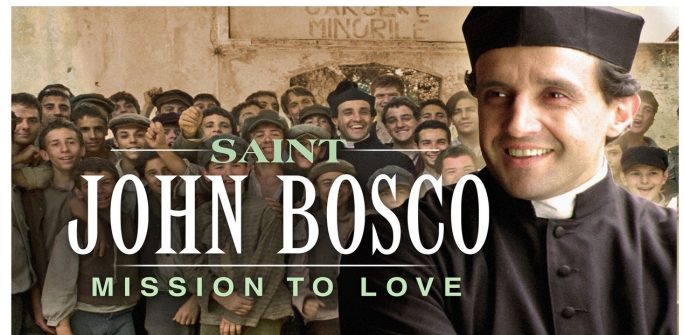

The Holy Mass: From Gathering to Sending Forth



The Entrance Procession: A Pilgrim People on the Move

Every Sunday Mass begins not with words, but with movement. The Entrance Procession may seem simple—servers walk in, the priest enters, we stand and sing—but in truth, it is already rich in meaning. It quietly teaches us who we are and what we are about to do as God's people.

Why do we stand and sing? Standing is a posture of respect, readiness, and joy. In the Scriptures, God's people stood before the Lord to listen and to serve. When we stand at the beginning of Mass, we are saying with our bodies, "Lord, we are ready to meet You." Singing unites our voices and hearts. It is not background music; it is prayer. Through the opening hymn, we gather our scattered thoughts, concerns, and experiences and offer them together to God.

The procession itself reminds us that we are a pilgrim people. Our faith is not static. Like the Israelites journeying through the desert, or the disciples following Jesus on the road, we are always "on the way." The Church is not just a building we enter; it is a people moving together toward God.

The cross, candles, and the priest's entrance are full of symbolism.

The cross leads the procession because Christ leads the Church. It reminds us that everything we do flows from His sacrifice and love. The candles represent Christ as the Light of the world, guiding us through darkness and illuminating our lives. Together, the cross and candles proclaim without words that Christ is present among His people.

The priest follows—not as a performer or the center of attention—but as one who represents Christ the Head, called to lead the assembly in prayer. His entrance reminds us that the Mass is not private devotion but the public worship of the Church.

Most importantly, the Entrance Procession teaches us that we come as one Body, not as individuals. We arrive with different stories—joys, struggles, hopes, and wounds—but we do not worship alone. The procession gathers us into one community, one family of faith. As St. Paul reminds us, "We, though many, are one body in Christ."

This is why arriving on time matters, why joining in the song matters, and why our posture matters. The Entrance Procession is not something we watch; it is something we enter into. It invites us to leave behind distractions and to step into sacred time.

As the procession moves toward the altar—the place of sacrifice and thanksgiving—we are reminded of our own journey toward God. Each Mass is a small pilgrimage, forming us week by week into a people who walk together in faith, hope, and love.

Next Sunday, as you stand and sing, remember: you are not just starting Mass—you are joining a holy journey.
