



How to Make a Good Examination of Conscience

An examination of conscience is a prayerful review of our thoughts, words, actions, and omissions in the light of God's love. It is not meant to make us afraid or discouraged, but to help us see ourselves honestly so that we may experience God's mercy more deeply. When done well, it becomes a moment of grace, healing, and conversion.

1. Begin with Prayer

A good examination of conscience always begins with prayer. Ask the Holy Spirit for light and honesty. We cannot truly know our hearts on our own; we need God's grace to see clearly. A simple prayer, such as "Come, Holy Spirit, help me to know my sins and trust in God's mercy," is enough to place us in the right disposition.

2. Remember God's Love and Mercy

Before looking at our sins, it is important to remember who God is. God is not a harsh judge waiting to condemn us, but a loving Father who desires our healing. The purpose of the examination is not self-accusation but reconciliation. Keeping God's mercy in mind prevents us from falling into either despair or excuses.

3. Review Your Life Honestly

Take time to reflect calmly on your life since your last confession. Look at your relationship with God, with others, and with yourself. Many people find it helpful to use guides such as the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes, or the duties of one's state in life.

Ask yourself concrete questions:

- Have I placed God first in my life through prayer, worship, and trust?
- Have I used God's name with reverence?
- Have I kept holy the Lord's Day?
- How have I treated my family, neighbors, and those I disagree with?
- Have I been honest, just, and charitable in my words and actions?
- Have I cared for the poor, the sick, and those in need?

Also reflect on sins of omission—good things you failed to do, such as neglecting prayer, forgiveness, or acts of charity.

4. Be Specific, Not Vague

A good examination of conscience is concrete. Rather than saying, "I have not loved enough," try to identify specific actions or attitudes: impatience, gossip, dishonesty, neglect of responsibilities, or lack of prayer. This helps form the conscience and makes confession more sincere and fruitful.

5. Avoid Extremes

There are two common mistakes to avoid. The first is being too harsh with oneself, focusing only on faults and forgetting God's mercy. The second is being too lenient, minimizing sin, or blaming others. A healthy examination holds truth and mercy together: honest acknowledgment of sin, combined with trust in God's forgiveness.

6. Stir Up Sorrow for Sin

True sorrow for sin does not come from fear alone but from love. As you recognize your sins, ask for a heart that is sorry because those sins have wounded your relationship with God and others. This sorrow prepares the soul to receive the grace of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

7. Make a Resolution to Change

An examination of conscience should lead to a concrete resolution. Ask yourself: What is one thing I can do differently with God's help? It may be a commitment to pray daily, to forgive someone, to avoid a particular sin, or to grow in patience and charity. Small, realistic resolutions are often the most effective.

8. End with Trust and Gratitude

Conclude your examination by thanking God for His patience and love. Even the ability to recognize our sins is already a gift of grace. Place yourself confidently in God's mercy, especially as you prepare for confession, trusting that the Lord who calls you to conversion is the same Lord who forgives and heals.

A good examination of conscience is not about looking inward with fear, but about opening our hearts to God's transforming love. When practiced regularly, it forms our conscience, deepens our humility, and leads us step by step toward a more faithful and joyful Christian life.
